On behalf of all the staff and faculty at CCC, we welcome you to your first year at Clovis Community College. We look forward to seeing you Crush it!



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


# WHY COMMUNITY COLLEGE





### FINANCIAL AID STEPS

Everyone has the opportunity to receive some type of financial aid, although many students assume they aren't eligible. Did you know that first-time college students can attend FREE (waived enrollment fees) regardless of income? Follow the steps below to apply for financial aid.

# STEP 1 - COMPLETE THE FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA) OR THE CALIFORNIA DREAM ACT APPLICATION (CADAA)

The CADAA is an application for undocumented, AB540 eligible students. If you're unsure if you should complete the FAFSA or Dream Act Application, please contact the Financial Aid Office.

- Visit https://studentaid.gov/fsa-id and create an Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID and then FAFSA.gov to complete your FAFSA Application.
- Visit dream.csac.ca.gov to complete the Dream Act Application. Submit your FAFSA or Dream Act application for the following school year. Make sure to add Clovis Community College (Federal School Code: 042534) to allow us to access the information.

#### STEP 2 – COMPLETE YOUR CLOVIS COMMUNITY COLLEGE FINANCIAL AID FILE

Check your student email regularly through your student portal (My Portal). The Financial Aid Office will email you if additional documents are needed or when your award letter is ready to view. You can also check Self-Service through My Portal for additional information.



# Other Financial Aid tips:

- Remember that many funds are awarded on a first come, first serve basis, so it's important to make sure you apply and complete your financial aid file early!
- In addition to state and federal aid, other scholarships may be available. Complete the CCC Scholarship Application at www.cloviscollege.edu/scholarships.
- To maintain your financial aid eligibility, you must meet the Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) policy which states you must:
  - Maintain a minimum cumulative 2.0 GPA.
  - Receive credit for at least 67% of the total units attempted.
  - Attempt less than 150% of the maximum cumulative units for your program.

# **COMMUNITY COLLEGE COUNSELING**


Academic, personal, and career counseling for students is a critical part of the planning process to:

- Ensure you are aware of the requirements necessary to meet your educational goal
- Research transfer requirements based on your choice of 4-year university and major of study
- Navigate college and finding a balance with school and personal life
- Provide students who are undecided with career planning services

# WHAT IF I'M NOT SURE OF MY MAJOR?

An estimated 20-50% of students entering college are not sure of their major or consider themselves as "Undecided". And 75% of college students change their major at least once. Selecting a major is an important process and Clovis would like to assist you in taking the first steps! To begin, lets just ask a simple question, "What type of Undecided Student are you?":

- ☐ There are two to three professions/majors I am looking at pursuing but I need more information to make an informed decision.
- ☐ I really have no idea where to even start!

So for now, a counselor can assist you based on which "Undecided Student" you are. For additional information and assistance with selecting a major, use our Career Resource Center (CRC) resources.




#### DID YOU EARN COLLEGE CREDIT WHILE IN HIGH SCHOOL?

Counselors will assist you in developing a Student Education Plan (SEP). The SEP is an important tool you will need to register for classes as it will:

- Identify your academic goal, current major, and professional goal.
- Outline recommended coursework based on major, transfer plan, and sequence of courses.
- Maintain your priority registration eligibility.

#### THERE ARE TWO TYPES OF SEPs:

- SEPA: An Abbreviated Student Educational Plan is typically completed when you first meet with a counselor, to identify the initial courses you will need to begin your educational pathway.
- **SEPC**: A Comprehensive Student Educational Plan is developed after 1-2 semesters as you orient yourself to college, identify/solidify a major, and select the university you plan to transfer to.

If you have additional questions, change your major, or just want to have a followup discussion with a counselor, schedule a counseling appointment.

Make sure to update your SEP each semester or if you change your major, the college you plan to transfer to, or other important objectives.





Make sure to see a counselor early in the semester so you have plenty of time before you are eligible to register (don't wait until the last minute)!

# **COMMON COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM (CCN)**

CHANGES EFFECTIVE FALL 2025 As a result of AB 1111, California Community Colleges are in Phase 1 of adopting a common course numbering system for all general education and transfer pathway courses. The purpose of the CCN system is to ensure that comparable courses across all community colleges have the same course number. The goal is to streamline the transfer process from California Community Colleges to four-year postsecondary educational institutions and reduce excess credit accumulation. The chart below provides a list of courses that will be offered throughout the SCCCD with a comparison of the current course prefix and number and the new course prefix and number based on the CCN system beginning fall 2025. If you have any questions, please contact your counselor at the college you are attending or plan to attend.

### REGISTERING FOR CLASSES


**Self-Service** is the system students use to register for classes. One benefit for students within State Center Community College District (SCCCD) is the ability to enroll at multiple campuses in the district (CCC, FCC, RCC, MCC). The SEP includes course planning specific to Clovis Community College curriculum, so taking courses at other campuses may not satisfy the same CalGETC, Local GE, and major requirements for the degree you intend to earn. In addition, you must have an identified major from the college you plan to receive financial aid from.

- Open the Self-Service app.






☐ The status will have a yellow **Scheduled** bar when it has been added to your schedule. Repeat until all of your classes are added to your schedule.



Click on Register for Classes/ View My Schedule on the Academics drop down menu on the left.

- ☐ Use the arrow buttons to select the right term.
- ☐ Click the **Register** button below each class.
- □ Check that the class turns green on the Schedule. If the class is yellow, you are not registered or may need to press the Waitlist button. If the class is red, it conflicts with another class.
- ☐ Classes that have no specific meeting time are listed at the bottom of the **Schedule.**
- □ Double check that all of your classes are showing as **Registered.** If you are waitlisted for a class, follow the directions below for more information.
- ☐ Take a picture or print your schedule so you have it on your phone the first week of classes.



# **WAITLISTING AND ADDING CLASSES**

#### What do I do if I am on the waitlist for a class?

- Check your college email every 1-2 days for a Permission to
   Register email. Once permission is granted, you will have 4 days to
   enroll in the class. If you have not enrolled before permission expires,
   you will be removed from the waitlist.
- If you are on the waitlist when the class starts, you will have priority to add the class following the steps below.

#### How do I add a class after it begins?

- If you would like to add a class after it starts, you will need to
  add the class to your schedule in Self-Service, then get an
  Authorization for Add from the instructor. To access instructor
  information click on the section in Self-Service for course details.
  You must be logged in to Self-Service to access instructor email
  addresses.
- On the first day of class, either attend the class or email the instructor if the class is online. Make sure to include your student ID number!
- If there is availability, the instructor will authorize you to add the class. As long as you are eligible for the course, you will now have the ability to register by adding the section to your schedule in Self-Service and then clicking the Register button.



# CAMPUS COMMUNICATION

  your student email and include your name,
  student ID number, and the class course.
  Use appropriate language, respectful greetings, and proofread before sending.
- Some instructors prefer to communicate via Canvas. Check your syllabus to see which method you should use. You won't be able to access Canvas until you are enrolled in the course.




